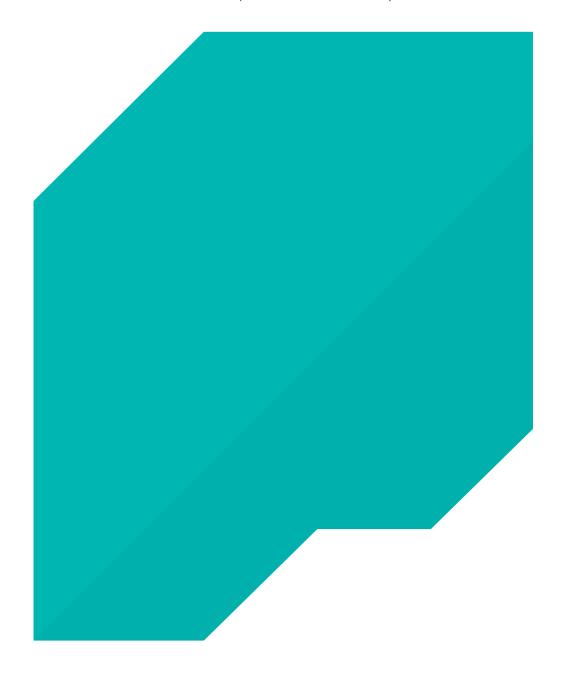

Launch of new 'Z' share classes on 12 November 2012

New 'Z' share classes, accumulation shares and income shares, were launched at 200p per share for the Invesco Perpetual Managed Growth Fund and Invesco Perpetual Managed Income Fund.

Change of Investment objective of the Invesco Perpetual Money Fund

We recently amended the investment objective of the Invesco Perpetual Money Fund. This change came into effect 12 November 2012.

This change has been made to bring the Invesco Perpetual Money Fund into line with amendments to the FCA Rules which were brought into force in 2012.

A consequence of these amendments is that the investment objectives of the funds like the Invesco Perpetual Money fund must be more prescriptively worded. However, these changes have not, and will not, affect the fund manager's investment approach and there has not been, and nor will there be, any impact on your investment.

The previous objective and the new objectives are detailed below:

Previous objective:

The fund aims to produce a high level of income return combined with a high degree of security. The fund intends to invest in Sterling based or related money market fund assets.

In pursuing this objective, the fund managers may include investments that they consider appropriate which include transferable securities, money market instruments, warrants, collective investment schemes, deposits and other permitted investments and transactions as detailed in Appendix 2 of the most recent Full Prospectus.

So that dealing in shares in the fund will not be subject to stamp duty or stamp duty reserve tax, the fund will hold only investments which are 'exempt investments' within the meaning of s.99 (5B) Finance Act 1999. In particular, the fund will not hold any investment in respect of which a charge to ad valorem stamp duty or stamp duty reserve tax would arise on its transfer or on an agreement for its transfer to the fund.

New objective:

The Invesco Perpetual Money Fund is a money market fund as defined in the COLL Sourcebook which aims to produce a level of income return in line with money market rates combined with maintenance of capital. The fund intends to invest in Sterling based or related money market fund assets.

In pursuing this objective, the fund managers may include investments that they consider appropriate which include transferable securities, money market instruments, warrants, collective investment schemes, deposits and other permitted investments and transactions as detailed in Appendix 2 of the most recent Full Prospectus.

So that dealing in shares in the fund will not be subject to stamp duty or stamp duty reserve tax, the fund will hold only investments which are 'exempt investments' within the meaning of schedule 19 of the Finance Act 1999. In particular, the fund will not hold any investment in respect of which a charge to ad valorem stamp duty or stamp duty reserve tax would arise on its transfer or on an agreement for its transfer to the fund.

Investment objective

The fund aims to achieve capital growth from a portfolio primarily of Qualifying Funds. In pursuing this objective, the fund managers may include investments that they consider appropriate which include transferable securities, money market instruments, warrants, collective investment schemes, deposits and other permitted investments and transactions as detailed in Appendix 2 of the most recent Full Prospectus.

The value of investments and any income will fluctuate (this may partly be the result of exchange rate fluctuations) and investors may not get back the full amount invested. Over time, inflation may erode the value of investments. Strategy, review and outlook

The fund returned 32.8% over the 12 months to the end of May 2013, compared to the benchmark FTSE World Index which returned 29.4%. This placed the fund in the first quartile of its peer group, the IMA Flexible Investment sector, which returned an average of 22.4%.

A profound change in mood has swept through global equity markets since the summer of 2012. Comments in July 2012 by European Central Bank (ECB) President Mario Draghi that the ECB would do "whatever it takes to save the euro" boosted markets and forced down Spain and Italy's borrowing costs.

In Q1 2013, the lessening of a number of risks, notably slowing Chinese growth, the European financial crisis and the US fiscal negotiations, continued to support global equity markets. At a time when many investors were caught too defensive being heavily exposed to bonds, leading equity indices have so far this year reached multiyear highs, although it is yet to become clear just how much steam there is left.

The unprecedented level of liquidity pumped into the financial system by central banks has had unintended consequences for financial markets, the full extent of which is only beginning to be felt. The recent market rally has been fuelled by central bank stimulus measures, such as quantitative easing (QE), along with low interest rates, which have been used to stimulate national economies. In Japan, the centrepiece of 'Abenomics', the policy creed of new prime minister Shinzo Abe. is the implementation of QE on a scale approaching that of the Bank of England and the US Federal Reserve. However, it is these large-scale purchases of government bonds against a backdrop of ultra-low interest rates, which have led to fluctuations in financial markets in recent weeks.

Risk appetite continued to grow during the period under review helping to extend the equity market rally which began in the summer of 2012. We continue to believe that there is value in global equity markets with earnings yields, dividend yields and balance sheets looking attractive to us.

The fund's overweight position in Japan relative to the benchmark index was a positive for fund performance. Japan had struggled in the early part of the review period but towards the end of 2012 and into 2013, Japanese market strength had increased, driven by new prime minister Shinzo Abe, who has been vocal in his desire to aggressively pursue policies aimed at kick-starting the economy.

In May 2013, the Bank of Japan announced that it would maintain its ambitious QE programme aimed at helping to achieve the 2% inflation target projected by the Bank of Japan for 2015. More cyclical areas of the market (those more sensitive to the economic cycle) rallied on this news and the fund benefited from its exposure to Japanese exporters and other cyclical areas of the market.

The fund's overweight exposure to Europe also benefited from a perceived change in sentiment. The shift away from an 'austerity-first' approach to a greater focus on economic growth helped to underpin European equity markets further.

In the UK, the fund's largely equity income exposure initially hurt fund performance as cyclical stocks rallied on Draghi's "whatever it takes" pledge. However, for the most part, the equity market rally of 2013 has been led by defensive stocks (typically considered as stable, dividend-paying stocks, regardless of the economic backdrop), which has been of benefit to the businesses in which the majority of the fund's UK equity exposure is invested.

On the negative side, our overweight exposure to Asia detracted from performance. Asian equities have struggled over concerns surrounding Chinese growth prospects and competition from Japan including a weakening yen which has made Japanese exports relatively more attractive than parts of the rest of Asia.

In terms of activity, the fund moved to a 5% cash position which we are looking to deploy strategically. We have reduced the fund's exposure to Latin America given concerns over inflation.

Investment objective

The fund aims to produce a level of income return in line with money market rates combined with maintenance of capital. The fund intends to invest in Sterling based or related money market fund assets. In pursuing this objective, the fund managers may include investments that they consider appropriate which include transferable securities, money market instruments, warrants, collective investment schemes, deposits and other permitted investments and transactions as detailed in Appendix 2 of the most recent Full Prospectus.

So that dealing in shares in the fund will not be subject to stamp duty or stamp duty reserve tax, the fund will hold only investments which are 'exempt investments' within the meaning of schedule 19 of the Finance Act 1999. In particular, the fund will not hold any investment in respect of which a charge to ad valorem stamp duty or stamp duty reserve tax would arise on its transfer or on an agreement for its transfer to the fund.

Strategy, review and outlook

The fund rose by 0.5% over the twelve months to the end of May 2013. This placed the fund in the second quartile of its peer group, the IMA Money Market Sector, which returned an average of 0.5%.

The UK economic recovery remains weak by historical standards. Domestic demand increased slightly over this period but that was largely offset by a pronounced fall in exports. GDP increased by 0.3% in Q1 2013 (+0.6% year on year) and is expected to strengthen a little over the course of 2013. Demand is being depressed by weak labour market conditions. Unemployment remained high, at 7.8% in April 2013, and earnings growth weak, at just 1.3% in April, well below the rate of inflation.

UK inflation (annual change in the Consumer Price Index) fell from 2.8% in May 2012 to 2.4% in May 2013, above the 2% target of the Bank of England. The bank's Monetary Policy Committee (MPC) maintained the bank's interest rate at a record low of 0.5% throughout the period, judging that this balanced the need to meet the inflation target in the medium term with providing continuing near-term support to the economy. The committee agreed in July 2012 to extend the bank's asset purchasing programme by £50bn to a total of £375bn.

Continued low UK interest rates resulted in low but positive returns for the fund.

The 2 year Gilt yield rose from 0.24% at the end of May 2012 to 0.37% at the end of May 2013 (equating to a price fall of around 2.4%), while the 10 year Gilt yield rose from 1.57% to 2.00%. These rises in yield in part reflect the greater investor appetite for lower credit quality assets such as corporate bonds. In interbank lending markets, over the last 12 months to the end of May, Sterling three-month LIBOR, the interest rate at which the largest banks lend money to one another, fell by 49 basis points to close on 0.51%.

In terms of strategy, we have maintained holdings in floating-rate notes (FRNs) where yields are reset every three months to reflect changes in LIBOR. As we continue to believe that UK interest rates will remain near their current low levels for a considerable time - because we think any policy adjustments will be gradual and drawn out - the fund also has positions in a number of government, quasi-government and corporate bonds. These have higher

interest coupons than those currently available on FRNs. In order to limit risk exposure, these bonds are both short dated and of high quality.

The MPC continues to look through any shorter term inflation to the underlying weakness of the economy. We expect that ongoing deleveraging and negative real earnings growth will exert downward pressure on prices and so we do not expect domestically generated inflation to rise significantly from here. Nor do we expect interest rates to rise quickly from current record low levels.
