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AVIVA INVESTORS MULTI-MANAGER FLEXIBLE FUND

On 1 May 2013 the Aviva Investors Fund of Funds Growth Fund was renamed as the Aviva Investors Multi-Manager Flexible Fund.

Investment Objective

The Fund aims to provide long-term capital growth by investing in other eligible Collective Investment Schemes (the Target Funds).

Investment Policy

Investment will be made in shares or units of the Target Funds, which invest in any geographical area or industry sector. Investments may also be made in derivatives for hedging purposes. The Fund will normally be invested in Target Funds whose objectives are equity investment. The Target Funds may however also invest in bonds, Property Securities, and money market instruments.

Risk Profile

The Fund invests in other collective investment schemes and exchange traded funds (ETFs) and by doing so assumes any specific risks associated with the schemes or funds. ETFs may have exposure to derivative instruments and therefore exposes the Fund to counterparty default risk.

The Fund has exposure to UK and overseas equities and fixed interest securities. Changes in exchange rates, interest rates and the credit ratings of companies issuing bonds may affect the performance of the Fund. The Fund has exposure to investments in countries deemed to be emerging markets that are usually considered to carry a greater degree of risk than investments in established markets. The solvency of organisations in which the Fund has exposure to can change and this can affect the Fund's capital.

Fund Manager's Report

The Fund returned 2.29 per cent* over the review period, as a sharp rise in the bulk of its equity investments outweighed the impact of a decline in emerging-market equity holdings. By comparison the Fund's Investment Management Association peer group generated a median (average) return of 1.96 per cent.

Major international equity markets advanced as demand for riskier assets continued to be swelled by extremely loose monetary policy around the world and a steady improvement in global economic data. However, shares came off the boil towards the end of the period after the head of the US central bank indicated stronger economic data may soon lead to the withdrawal of some of the extraordinary policy measures that have been supporting financial markets in recent years.

Government bonds produced negative returns as the US central bank's threat to scale back bond purchases sparked a steep rise in treasury yields. With the US economy performing far better than many had expected, given a sharp tightening of fiscal policy at the start of this year, the Federal Reserve signalled it was poised to rein in monetary policy for the first time since the financial crisis of 2008. UK government bond prices came under further pressure as the Bank of England, encouraged by signs of a pick-up in the domestic economy, decided not to expand its gilt-purchase programme. Ten-year yields rose to their highest level in two years.

Corporate bonds also delivered negative returns on the back of the slide in government debt prices, although investors' growing appetite for risk ensured corporate debt fell by less.

Asset allocation decisions within equity markets were costly, notably the Fund's overweight in emerging markets, underweight in North America and neutral position in Europe.

Fund Manager's Report (continued)

On a positive note, having no exposure to fixed income was beneficial to performance, while stock selection in UK equities was also successful as managers delivered strong returns relative to the underlying benchmark.

Outlook

The outlook for riskier asset classes, and equities in particular, appears favourable given the improving economic landscape and the fact risk-free interest rates remain at historically low levels.

That said, as we have seen in recent months, markets are vulnerable to the mere threat of central banks withdrawing some of the extraordinary policy measures that have been in place since the financial crisis of 2008.

In terms of data, the US economy appears to be improving steadily. Although the pace of recovery remains lacklustre, that is largely the result of the fiscal tightening seen in the first quarter and we expect growth to accelerate in the second half. Even in Europe output appears to be expanding and the recovery should gradually gather momentum. The economic situation has picked up somewhat in other regions too, with recent data out of China and Japan generally beating estimates.

The Fund is overweight equities since valuations look attractive relative to other asset classes, in particular fixed income. We have also recently reduced exposure to alternatives, boosting the Fund's cash position. That should help to partially offset the increased volatility of fund returns likely to ensure from the overweight in equities.

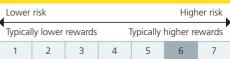

AVIVA INVESTORS MULTI-MANAGER 20-60% SHARES FUND

On 1 May 2013 the Aviva Investors Fund of Funds Cautious Fund was renamed as the Aviva Investors Multi-Manager 20-60% Shares Fund.

Investment Objective

The Fund aims to provide long-term capital growth and income by investing in other eligible Collective Investment Schemes (the Target Funds).

Investment Policy

Investment will be made in shares or units of the Target Funds, which invest in any geographical area or industry sector. Investments may also be made in derivatives for hedging purposes. Although the Target Funds may invest in equities, bonds, Property Securities, or money market instruments, it is anticipated that up to 60% of the Fund will be invested in Target Funds whose objectives are equity investment.

Risk Profile

The Fund invests in other collective investment schemes and exchange traded funds (ETFs) and by doing so assumes any specific risks associated with the schemes or funds. ETFs may have exposure to derivative instruments and therefore exposes the Fund to counterparty default risk.

Changes in exchange rates, interest rates and the credit ratings of companies issuing bonds may affect the performance of the Fund. Fund Manager's Report

The Fund returned 0.11 per cent* over the review period, as a sharp rise in the bulk of its equity investments offset declines in emerging-market equity and fixed-income holdings. By comparison the Fund's Investment Management Association peer group generated a median (average) return of 1.11 per cent.

Major international equity markets advanced as demand for riskier assets continued to be swelled by extremely loose monetary policy around the world and a steady improvement in global economic data. However, shares came off the boil towards the end of the period after the head of the US central bank indicated stronger economic data may soon lead to the withdrawal of some of the extraordinary policy measures that have been supporting financial markets in recent years.

Government bonds produced negative returns as the US central bank's threat to scale back bond purchases sparked a steep rise in treasury yields. With the US economy performing far better than many had expected, given a sharp tightening of fiscal policy at the start of this year, the Federal Reserve signalled it was poised to rein in monetary policy for the first time since the financial crisis of 2008. UK government bond prices came under further pressure as the Bank of England, encouraged by signs of a pick-up in the domestic economy, decided not to expand its gilt-purchase programme. Ten-year yields rose to their highest level in two years.

Corporate bonds also delivered negative returns on the back of the slide in government debt prices, although investors' growing appetite for risk ensured corporate debt fell by less.

Asset allocation decisions within equity markets were costly, notably the Fund's overweight in emerging markets, underweight in North America and neutral position in Europe.

Fund Manager's Report (continued)

On a positive note, an underweight in fixed income was beneficial to performance, while stock selection in UK equities was also successful as managers delivered strong returns relative to the underlying benchmark.

Outlook

The outlook for riskier asset classes, and equities in particular, appears favourable given the improving economic landscape and the fact risk-free interest rates remain at historically low levels.

That said, as we have seen in recent months, markets are vulnerable to the mere threat of central banks withdrawing some of the extraordinary policy measures that have been in place since the financial crisis of 2008.

In terms of data, the US economy appears to be improving steadily. Although the pace of recovery remains lacklustre, that is largely the result of the fiscal tightening seen in the first quarter and we expect growth to accelerate in the second half. Even in Europe output appears to be expanding and the recovery should gradually gather momentum. The economic situation has picked up somewhat in other regions too, with recent data out of China and Japan generally beating estimates.

The Fund is overweight equities since valuations look attractive relative to other asset classes, in particular fixed income. We have also recently reduced exposure to alternatives, boosting the Fund's cash position. That should help to partially offset the increased volatility of fund returns likely to ensure from the overweight in equities.

In recent weeks we increased the Fund's exposure to equities, especially in developed markets, to take advantage of what we perceived to be cheap valuations given an improvement in global economic prospects. The Fund is now overweight US stocks reflecting improving fundamentals.

We have also gone overweight the Japanese market in the belief attempts by authorities in the country to reflate the domestic economy will pay off. But we continue to hedge exposure to the yen since a weaker currency is one of the primary ways in which Japan is aiming to boost economic activity. We have simultaneously cut exposure to emerging-market equities and commodities.

We have also reduced the Fund's investments in fixed income – investment-grade and high-yield corporate, emerging-market and government, debt – where risk-adjusted returns look far less compelling than in equities. And we have continued to look to reduce the sensitivity of the Fund's fixed-income holdings to changes in interest rates by investing in loans and floating-rate notes.

Overall, the volatility of expected returns (risk) has increased slightly due to the higher weighting in equities and lower weighting in fixed income, although it remains within the pre-determined risk band.

Fund Manager's Report

The Fund returned 0.18 per cent* over the review period, as the bulk of its equity holdings and investments in other asset classes such as property delivered strong returns, outweighing the impact of a sharp fall in the value of fixed-income investments.

Major international equity markets advanced as demand for riskier assets continued to be swelled by extremely loose monetary policy around the world and a steady improvement in global economic data. However, shares came off the boil towards the end of the period after the head of the US central bank indicated stronger economic data may soon lead to the withdrawal of some of the extraordinary policy measures that have been supporting financial markets in recent years.

Fund Manager's Report (continued)

Government bonds produced negative returns as the US central bank's threat to scale back bond purchases sparked a steep rise in treasury yields. With the US economy performing far better than many had expected, given a sharp tightening of fiscal policy at the start of this year, the Federal Reserve signalled it was poised to rein in monetary policy for the first time since the financial crisis of 2008. UK government bond prices came under further pressure as the Bank of England, encouraged by signs of a pick-up in the domestic economy, decided not to expand its gilt-purchase programme. Ten-year yields rose to their highest level in two years.

Corporate bonds also delivered negative returns on the back of the slide in government debt prices, although investors' growing appetite for risk ensured corporate debt fell by less.

Outlook

In recent weeks we increased the Fund's exposure to equities, especially in developed markets, to take advantage of what we perceived to be cheap valuations given an improvement in global economic prospects. The Fund is now overweight US stocks reflecting improving fundamentals.

We have also gone overweight the Japanese market in the belief attempts by authorities in the country to reflate the domestic economy will pay off. But we continue to hedge exposure to the yen since a weaker currency is one of the primary ways in which Japan is aiming to boost economic activity. We have simultaneously cut exposure to emerging-market equities and commodities.

We have also reduced the Fund's investments in fixed income – investment-grade and high-yield corporate, emerging-market and government, debt – where risk-adjusted returns look far less compelling than in equities. And we have continued to look to reduce the sensitivity of the Fund's fixed-income holdings to changes in interest rates by investing in loans and floating-rate notes.

Overall, the volatility of expected returns (risk) has increased slightly due to the higher weighting in equities and lower weighting in fixed income, although it remains within the pre-determined risk band.

Fund Manager's Report

The Fund returned -0.43 per cent* over the review period, as a sharp fall in the value of fixed-income investments outweighed the impact of a gain in its equity holdings and investments in other asset classes such as property.

Major international equity markets advanced as demand for riskier assets continued to be swelled by extremely loose monetary policy around the world and a steady improvement in global economic data. However, shares came off the boil towards the end of the period after the head of the US central bank indicated stronger economic data may soon lead to the withdrawal of some of the extraordinary policy measures that have been supporting financial markets in recent years.

Fund Manager's Report (continued)

Government bonds produced negative returns as the US central bank's threat to scale back bond purchases sparked a steep rise in treasury yields. With the US economy performing far better than many had expected, given a sharp tightening of fiscal policy at the start of this year, the Federal Reserve signalled it was poised to rein in monetary policy for the first time since the financial crisis of 2008. UK government bond prices came under further pressure as the Bank of England, encouraged by signs of a pick-up in the domestic economy, decided not to expand its gilt-purchase programme. Ten-year yields rose to their highest level in two years.

Corporate bonds also delivered negative returns on the back of the slide in government debt prices, although investors' growing appetite for risk ensured corporate debt fell by less.

Outlook

In recent months we increased the Fund's exposure to equities, especially in developed markets, to take advantage of what we perceived to be cheap valuations given an improvement in global economic prospects. The Fund is now overweight US stocks reflecting improving fundamentals.

We have also gone overweight the Japanese market in the belief attempts by authorities in the country to reflate the domestic economy will pay off. But we continue to hedge exposure to the yen since a weaker currency is one of the primary ways in which Japan is aiming to boost economic activity. We have simultaneously cut exposure to emerging-market equities and commodities.

We have also reduced the Fund's investments in fixed income – investment-grade and high-yield corporate, emerging-market and government, debt – where risk-adjusted returns look far less compelling than in equities. And we have continued to look to reduce the sensitivity of the Fund's fixed-income holdings to changes in interest rates by investing in loans and floating-rate notes.

Overall, the volatility of expected returns (risk) has increased slightly due to the higher weighting in equities and lower weighting in fixed income, although it remains within the pre-determined risk band.

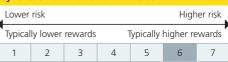

With the US economy performing far better than many had expected, given a sharp tightening of fiscal policy at the start of this year, the Federal Reserve signalled it was poised to rein in monetary policy for the first time since the financial crisis of 2008.

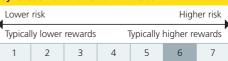
