Manager's Investment Report

Investment Objective and Policy

The objective of the Trust is to provide capital growth by investing in a broad range of asset classes through Collective Investment Schemes.

The Trust will invest in a wide range of Collective Investment Schemes (including unregulated Collective Investment Schemes) that may hold shares in companies, bonds issued by companies and governments, gold, property, cash, permitted deposits and money market instruments (such as Treasury bills).

The Trust aims to have exposure of between 40% and 85% of the value of the Trust in shares of companies. The Trust will typically have balanced exposure between assets the Manager believes will generate income and assets that will grow in value, relative to other funds in the Legal & General Multi-Manager Trust range.

The Manager may select Collective Investment Schemes that invest across all countries, currencies and sector representations. The Collective Investment Schemes that the Trust invests in may be actively or passively managed and up to 50% of the Collective Investment Schemes may be managed or operated by the Manager or an associate of the Manager.

The Trust may also invest directly in shares in companies, bonds (issued by companies and governments), money market instruments (such as Treasury bills), cash and deposits.

The Trust will only use derivatives for Efficient Portfolio Management purposes.

During the year under review, the published price of the Trust's R-class accumulation units increased by 4.39% compared to the IMA Mixed Investment 40-85% Shares sector average return, on a Total Return basis, of 3.26%. Market/Economic Review

Over the year under review, inflationary pressures and tighter monetary policy continued to dominate the thoughts of market participants. Fears of an economic slowdown remain at the forefront of the minds of investors but, even with inflation falling across developed markets, expectations are that interest rates will remain higher for longer and no sharp cutting of rates is anticipated imminently.

In the UK, there was positive news as wage growth slowed yet further in the three months to November, rising at an annual rate of 6.50%, down from 7.20% in the three months to October. Annualised consumer price inflation was at 4.00% in December. The Bank of England has held rates unchanged at the 15-year high of 5.25% since its August 2023 meeting, while expectations for rate cuts have been pushed into the back end of 2024 at the earliest. Elsewhere, the UK economy grew by more than expected in November, following a buoyant month for services and retail.

In the US, Federal Reserve (Fed) Chair Jerome Powell poured cold water on the prospects of an interest rate cut in March, despite inflation continuing to fall in recent months. The US central bank chief explained that the Fed needs to have confidence that inflation is 'sustainably' lower. US interest rates remain at a 23-year high of between 5.25% and 5.50%, while the Fed's so-called 'dot-plot' predicting rates at between 4.50% and 4.75% by the end of the year. Meanwhile, the US economy grew at a faster-than-expected rate in the fourth quarter of 2023, growing at an annualised rate of 3.30% (versus forecasts of 2.00%).

The European Central Bank (ECB) kept its headline deposit facility rate at an all-time high of 4.00% in January, with President Christine Lagarde reiterating that it is premature to be discussing interest rate cuts. Calls for a loosening of monetary policy were supported by falling inflation in Germany and France, with German consumer prices rising at an annualised rate of 3.10% in December, while French inflation fell to a two-year low of 2.40% in the 12 months to January. Meanwhile, there was bad news for Germany as the region's largest economy won the undesired title of 'worst performing major economy in the world' in 2023, as it contracted by 0.30%.

The days of widespread ultra-loose central bank monetary policy are seemingly over, with the Bank of Japan (BoJ) – the last bastion of such an approach – making the notable move to tweak its yield curve control in July, furthering loosening it in October, and then effectively scrapping it in December. The policy, in place since 2016, had originally limited the movement of the 10-year bond yield to 0.50%. It has been replaced by a reference rate of 1.00%, rather than a cap, which will negate the need for unlimited BoJ purchases and allows some long-term interest rate flexibility.

Trust Review

The Trust outperformed its sector over the year. Fund selection was positive, with the key contributors of returns being Artemis UK Select Fund, Schroder Recovery Fund, Man GLG Continental European Growth Fund and Metropole Euro SRI although these gains were offset somewhat by the holdings in Federated Hermes Global Emerging Markets SMID Equity Fund and Artemis Income Fund.

In terms of Asset Allocation, the Trust benefitted from its underweight to Fixed Income and overweight to Japanese Equities although the underweights to US and European equities proved negative for relative performance.

Activity in the portfolio included new holdings in WS Lightman European Fund, Wellington Global Stewards Fund and some Legal & General Thematic ETFs, as well as selling out of our holdings in Jupiter UK Mid-Cap and Metropole Euro SRI. Elsewhere, some currency futures were switched around to reflect the team's changing asset allocation views.

Outlook

Stronger-than-expected US economic data, more rapid declines in inflation, and a policy pivot by the US Federal Reserve (US) has led us to adjust our base case economic forecast for 2024, with the Fed now seemingly more willing to risk stoking inflation to support economic growth through rate cuts. While we still believe the lagged effects of 2023 rate hikes could precipitate a US recession in 2024, this is no longer our base case view. We now expect a period of weak US growth and should a recession occur, a milder one than previously thought. Despite this upward revision, we remain below market consensus which increasingly expects steady US growth in 2024. In our view, a macroeconomic backdrop of tight labour markets and high interest rates limits the upside growth potential for the economy; we remain vigilant for evidence which refutes this stance.

Although the fourth-quarter risk asset rally left equities looking more expensive in absolute terms, lower bonds yields have improved valuations on a relative basis. Given our more benign economic outlook we have moderated our negative medium-term view on equities. We prefer more defensive positioning, with current equity market pricing vulnerable to any negative surprises, in our view. The recent sharp rally in yields has prompted us to temper our positive outlook for government bonds. However, we still view rates as restrictive at current levels and anticipate further declines in government bond yields over the medium term.

Independent Auditor's Report

Independent auditor's report to the Unitholders of Legal & General Multi Manager Balanced Trust ('the Trust')

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of the Trust for the year ended 15 January 2024 which comprise the Statement of Total Return, the Statement of Change in Net Assets Attributable to Unitholders, the Balance Sheet, the Related Notes and Distribution Tables for the Trust and the accounting policies set out on pages 19 to 21.

In our opinion, the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view, in accordance with UK accounting standards, including
 FRS 102 The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of
 Ireland, of the financial position of the Trust as at 15 January 2024 and of the net
 revenue and the net capital gains on the property of the Trust for the year then
 ended; and
- have been properly prepared in accordance with the Trust Deed, the Statement of Recommended Practice relating to UK Authorised Funds, and the COLL Rules.

Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK) ("ISAs (UK)") and applicable law. Our responsibilities are described below. We have fulfilled our ethical responsibilities under, and are independent of the Trust in accordance with, UK ethical requirements including the FRC Ethical Standard.

We have received all the information and explanations which we consider necessary for the purposes of our audit and we believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is a sufficient and appropriate basis for our opinion.

Going concern

The Manager has prepared the financial statements on the going concern basis as they do not intend to liquidate the Trust or to cease their operations, and as they have concluded that the Trust's financial position means that this is realistic. They have also concluded that there are no material uncertainties that could have cast significant doubt over their ability to continue as a going concern for at least a year from the date of approval of the financial statements ("the going concern period").

In our evaluation of the Manager's conclusions, we considered the inherent risks to the Trust's business model and analysed how those risks might affect the Trust's financial resources or ability to continue operations over the going concern period.

Our conclusions based on this work:

- we consider that the Manager's use of the going concern basis of accounting in the preparation of the financial statements is appropriate;
- we have not identified, and concur with the Manager's assessment that there is not, a material uncertainty related to events or conditions that, individually or collectively, may cast significant doubt on the Trust's ability to continue as a going concern for the going concern period.

However, as we cannot predict all future events or conditions and as subsequent events may result in outcomes that are inconsistent with judgements that were reasonable at the time they were made, the above conclusions are not a guarantee that the Trust will continue in operation.

Fraud and breaches of laws and regulations - ability to detect

Identifying and responding to risks of material misstatement due to fraud

To identify risks of material misstatement due to fraud ("fraud risks") we assessed events or conditions that could indicate an incentive or pressure to commit fraud or provide an opportunity to commit fraud. Our risk assessment procedures included:

- Enquiring of directors as to the Trust's high-level policies and procedures to prevent and detect fraud, as well as whether they have knowledge of any actual, suspected or alleged fraud;
- Assessing the segregation of duties in place between the Manager, the Trustee, the Administrator and the Investment Adviser;
- Reading board minutes.

As required by auditing standards, we perform procedures to address the risk of management override of controls, in particular the risk that management may be in a position to make inappropriate accounting entries. On this audit we do not believe there is a fraud risk related to revenue recognition because the revenue is principally nonjudgemental and based on publicly available information, with limited opportunity for manipulation. We did not identify any additional fraud risks.

We evaluated the design and implementation of the controls over journal entries and other adjustments and made inquiries of the Administrator about inappropriate or unusual activity relating to the processing of journal entries and other adjustments. We identified and selected a sample of journal entries made at the end of the reporting period and tested those substantively including all material post-closing entries. Based on the results of our risk assessment procedures and understanding of the process, including the segregation of duties between the Directors and the Administrator, no further high-risk journal entries or other adjustments were identified.

Identifying and responding to risks of material misstatement due to non-compliance with laws and regulations

We identified areas of laws and regulations that could reasonably be expected to have a material effect on the financial statements from our general commercial and sector experience and through discussion with the Manager and the Administrator (as required by auditing standards) and discussed with the Directors the policies and procedures regarding compliance with laws and regulations.

The potential effect of these laws and regulations on the financial statements varies considerably.

Firstly, the Trust is subject to laws and regulations that directly affect the financial statements including financial reporting legislation (including related authorised fund legislation maintained by the Financial Conduct Authority) and taxation legislation and we assessed the extent of compliance with these laws and regulations as part of our procedures on the related financial statement items.

Independent Auditor's Report continued

Secondly, the Trust is subject to many other laws and regulations where the consequences of non-compliance could have a material effect on amounts or disclosures in the financial statements, for instance through the imposition of fines or litigation. We identified the following areas as those most likely to have such an effect: money laundering, data protection and bribery and corruption legislation recognising the Trust's activities. Auditing standards limit the required audit procedures to identify non-compliance with these laws and regulations to enquiry of the Directors and the Administrator and inspection of regulatory and legal correspondence, if any. Therefore if a breach of operational regulations is not disclosed to us or evident from relevant correspondence, an audit will not detect that breach.

Context of the ability of the audit to detect fraud or breaches of law or regulation

Owing to the inherent limitations of an audit, there is an unavoidable risk that we may not have detected some material misstatements in the financial statements, even though we have properly planned and performed our audit in accordance with auditing standards. For example, the further removed non-compliance with laws and regulations is from the events and transactions reflected in the financial statements, the less likely the inherently limited procedures required by auditing standards would identify it.

In addition, as with any audit, there remained a higher risk of non-detection of fraud, as these may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal controls. Our audit procedures are designed to detect material misstatement. We are not responsible for preventing non-compliance or fraud and cannot be expected to detect non-compliance with all laws and regulations.

Other information

The Manager (Legal & General (Unit Trust Managers) Limited) is responsible for the other information presented in the Annual Manager's Report together with the financial statements. Notes to the Financial Statements

1. Statement of Compliance

The Financial Statements have been prepared in compliance with UK Financial Reporting Standard 102 (FRS 102) and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice for UK Authorised Funds issued by the Investment Association in May 2014 (2014 SORP) and amended in June 2017.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Basis of Preparation

The Financial Statements have been prepared on a going concern basis, under the historical cost convention as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities measured at fair value through profit or loss. In making this assessment, the Manager has considered, amongst other things, factors such as Trust size, cash flows through the Trust and Trust liquidity in its assessment of the Trust's ability to meet its liabilities as they fall due for at least the twelve month period from the date the financial statements are signed. Based on this assessment, the Manager deems the basis of preparation appropriate.

The principal accounting policies which have been applied consistently are set out below.

(b) Functional and Presentation Currency

The functional and presentation currency of the Trust is Sterling.

(c) Recognition of Revenue

Revenue from quoted equities and non-equity shares is recognised net of attributable tax credits when the security is quoted ex-dividend. Revenue from unquoted equity investments is recognised net of attributable tax credits when the dividend is declared.

Overseas revenue received after the deduction of withholding tax is shown gross of taxation, with the taxation consequences shown within the taxation charge.

Special dividends are treated as either revenue or capital depending on the facts of each particular case.

Bond revenue is accounted for on an effective yield basis, calculated with reference to the purchase price. If the Manager believes that future commitments will not be met due to the bond issuer showing signs of financial distress, revenue accruals will be discounted. Any resultant revenue from these issues will then be treated on a receipts basis.

Revenue from distribution and accumulation units in Collective Investment Schemes is recognised when the distribution is quoted ex-dividend.

Equalisation on distributions received from Collective Investment Schemes is treated as capital property of the Trust.

Rebates received from underlying Collective Investment Schemes are treated as revenue or capital depending on the treatment of the Manager's fees in the underlying Trust.

Revenue from offshore funds is recognised when it is reported.

Revenue from derivative instruments is treated in accordance with note 2(i).

All other revenue is recognised on an accruals basis.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies continued

(d) Treatment of Expenses

All expenses (other than those relating to the purchase and sale of investments) are charged against revenue on an accruals basis.

(e) Distribution Policy

The policy is to distribute all available revenue, after deduction of those expenses which are chargeable in calculating the distribution. In order to conduct a controlled dividend flow, interim distributions will be at the Manager's discretion, up to a maximum of the distributable revenue for the period. All remaining revenue is distributed in accordance with the COLL.

Fund Management Fees are deducted from revenue for the purpose of calculating the distribution.

Distributions which have remained unclaimed by Unitholders for over six years are credited to the capital property of the Trust.

(f) Basis of Valuation of Investments

All investments are valued at their fair value as at 12 noon on 15 January 2024, being the last business day of the accounting year. For the investments in United States, the latest available valuation was as at close of business on 12 January 2024. The fair value for non-derivative securities is bid market price, excluding any accrued interest. The fair value for units in Collective Investment Schemes is the cancellation price or bid price for dual priced funds and single price for single priced funds. The fair value for derivative instruments is the cost of closing out the contract on the last working day of the accounting year.

Where values cannot be readily determined, the securities are valued at the Manager's best assessment of their fair and reasonable value.

(g) Taxation

Provision is made for taxation at current rates on the excess of investment revenue over expenses, with relief for overseas taxation taken where appropriate.

Deferred tax is provided for on all timing differences that have originated but not reversed by the balance sheet date, other than those differences that are regarded as permanent. Any liability to deferred tax is provided for at the average rate of tax expected to apply.

(h) Foreign Exchange

Transactions in foreign currencies are translated at the rate of exchange ruling on the date of the transaction. Where applicable, assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into Sterling at the rates of exchange ruling at 12 noon on 15 January 2024, being the last business day of the accounting year.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies continued

(i) Derivative Instruments

The Trust may make use of financial derivative instruments for Efficient Portfolio Management (EPM) purposes. EPM aims to reduce risk, reduce costs, or generate additional capital or income for the Trust with an acceptably low level of risk. These aims allow for tactical asset allocation, which is a temporary switch in investment exposure through the use of derivatives rather than trading the underlying securities.

Derivative instruments held within the Trust have been accounted for and taxed in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice for Authorised Funds (IA SORP 2014). Returns on derivative transactions have been treated as either revenue or capital depending on the motives and circumstances on acquisition.

(j) Cash Equivalents

Cash equivalents reflect short-term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash, including liquidity funds held for cash management purposes and denominated in Sterling where there is assessed to be an insignificant risk of change in value.

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12. Financial Instruments and Associated Risks

The investments of a Trust in financial securities and derivatives are subject to normal market fluctuations and other risks inherent in investing in such instruments. Legal & General (Unit Trust Managers) Limited (UTM) is the Authorised Fund Manager and has responsibility for ensuring appropriate risk management processes are implemented for each Unit Trust.

The UTM Board has delegated the risk oversight function to the Fund Manager Oversight Committee (FMOC), a committee of the Legal & General Investment Management (Holdings) Limited (LGIMH) Board that meets monthly. The primary objective of the FMOC is to ensure proper oversight of the investment management activities and associated services performed by LGIM, its delegates and other Fund Managers, under the Investment Management Agreement (IMA), on behalf of UTM in its capacity as Authorised Fund Manager. The committee consists of senior members of LGIMH and members of the UTM Board. Other senior staff members are also in attendance, as required by the agenda.

Each Trust has Investment Guidelines, an Investment Objective and Investment Restrictions, against which the fund manager will operate. These are set out in Schedule 1 of the IMA between LGIM and UTM. The Schedule is maintained by each fund manager, reviewed by the LGIM Operational Risk and Compliance Teams and approved senior members of LGIMH on behalf of the UTM board. The Schedule provides the detail needed to determine the risk profile for each fund. Fund managers are not permitted to invest into any new instruments without first gaining approval from UTM.

The Investment Objective and Policy of this Trust is detailed on page 2.

(a) Market Risk arising from other price risk

Market Risk arises mainly from uncertainty about future prices. It represents the potential loss the Trust may suffer through holding market positions in the face of market movements.

Other price risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices (other than those arising from interest rate risk or currency risk), whether those changes are caused by factors specific to the individual financial instrument or its issuer, or factors affecting similar instruments traded in the market.

The assets held by the Trust can be seen in the Portfolio Statement starting on page 9. Movements in the prices of these investments result in movements in the performance of the Trust. The Manager adheres to the investment guidelines established in the Trust Deed, the Prospectus, the COLL and the Trust's IOG, and in this way, monitors and controls the exposure to risk from any type of security, sector or issuer.

As at the balance sheet date, if the price of the investments held by the Trust increased or decreased by 5%, with all other variables remaining constant, then the net assets attributable to unitholders would increase or decrease by approximately $\pounds973,893$ (15 January 2023: $\pounds929,544$).

(b) Interest Rate Risk

Interest Rate Risk is the risk of movements in the value of financial instruments as a result of fluctuations in interest rates.

The Trust is exposed to interest rate risk through its holdings in debt securities and underlying collective investment schemes that pay interest distributions. The market value of debt securities and any floating rate payments from debt securities held (and interest rate swaps) may fluctuate as a result of changes in interest rates. This risk is managed by the active monitoring and adjustment of the investments held directly by this Trust and within each underlying funds that invests in debt securities, in line with the stated investment objective and policy of the Trust.

As at the balance sheet date, the Trust held £4,679,413 (23.22% of the net asset value of the Trust) of investments in interest bearing funds and held £304,765 (1.51% of the net asset value of the Trust) of investments in debt securities. The Trust's other interest bearing financial instruments were its bank balances, overdraft facilities and holdings in the LGIM Sterling Liquidity Plus Fund as disclosed in note 9. Cash is deposited, and overdraft facilities utilised on normal commercial terms.

(c) Foreign Currency Risk

Foreign Currency Risk is the risk of movements in the value of financial instruments as a result of fluctuations in exchange rates. This risk may be managed by the use of forward currency contracts or currency futures as necessary.

As this Trust invests in other collective investment schemes that hold investment instruments in overseas financial securities, there is currency risk in respect of the financial instruments held by those schemes.

Forward currency contracts were utilised during the current and the preceding year.

As at the balance sheet date, if the value of Sterling increased or decreased by 1% against all currencies, with all other variables remaining constant, then the net assets attributable to unitholders would increase or decrease by approximately \pounds 23,912 (15 January 2023: \pounds 27,343).

(d) Credit Risk

Credit Risk is the risk of suffering financial loss as a result of a counterparty to a financial transaction being unable to fulfil their financial obligations as they fall due.

Bonds or other debt securities involve credit risk to the issuer which may be evidenced by the issuer's credit rating. Securities which are subordinated and/or have a lower credit rating are generally considered to have a higher credit risk and a greater possibility of default than more highly rated securities.

The Trust's investments in bonds expose it to the default risk of the bond issuer with regards interest payments and principal repayments. At the balance sheet date, none of the bonds held by the Trust had low credit ratings (sub-investment grade).

As this Trust invests in Collective Investment Schemes, there is credit risk in respect of the assets held by these Schemes. This risk is managed in this Trust and the underlying Collective Investment Schemes by appraising the credit profile of financial instruments and issuers in line with the Trust's investment objective and policy.

The Trust's holdings in Futures expose the Trust to additional credit risk. Credit risk arises from the failure of the counterparty to the derivative contract to meet its financial obligations. The Trust aims to limit credit risk derived from derivative positions by carrying out transactions with reputable and well established institutions.

(e) Liquidity Risk

Liquidity Risk relates to the capacity to meet liabilities as they fall due. The primary source of this risk to the Trust is the liability to Unitholders for any cancellation of units.

The Trust can also be exposed to liquidity risk through its commitments under derivative contracts, whereby additional margin payments or collateral payments may need to be posted with the counterparty or clearing house.

This risk is minimised by holding a large proportion of readily realisable assets, cash balances and via access to overdraft facilities.

(f) Derivative Risk - Sensitivity Analysis

Derivative Risk arises from uncertainty about future market movements. This risk is managed by the policies shown within Market risk.

As at the balance sheet date, the Trust made use of the following derivatives:

Futures (excluding Currency Futures)

Futures are used to adjust the duration and interest rate risk of the Trust, and to adjust the equities exposure of the Trust, in a cost effective manner. The effect of these instruments was to increase the exposure of the Trust by \pounds 384,817 (15 January 2023: increase the exposure by \pounds 850,033), representing 1.91% of the net asset value (15 January 2023: 4.27%).

This results in an effective equity exposure at the year end of 98.56% (15 January 2023: 97.70%) of net assets, which means that the gains or losses of the Trust will be 0.9856 (15 January 2023: 0.9770) times the gains or losses if the Trust was fully invested in equities.

(g) Fair Value

The fair value of a financial instrument is the amount for which it could be exchanged between knowledgeable, willing parties in an arm's length transaction. There is no material difference between the value of the financial assets and liabilities, as shown in the financial statements, and their fair value.

The Statement of Recommended Practice for Financial Statements of UK Authorised Funds issued by the Investment Association in May 2014 and amended in June 2017 requires the classification of the Trust's financial instruments held at the year end into a 3 tiered fair value hierarchy. Trust Information

The Comparative Tables on pages 38 to 43 give the performance of each active unit class in the Trust.

The 'Return after charges' disclosed in the Comparative Tables is calculated as the return after operating charges per unit divided by the opening net asset value per unit. It differs from the Trust's performance disclosed in the Manager's report, which is calculated based on the latest published price.

Portfolio transaction costs are incurred when investments are bought or sold by a fund in order to achieve the investment objective. These transaction costs affect an investor in different ways depending on whether they are joining, leaving or continuing with their investment in the Trust.

Direct transaction costs include broker commission and taxes. Broker commission includes the fee paid to a broker to execute the trades and research costs.

In addition, there are indirect portfolio transaction costs arising from the 'dealing spread' – the difference between the buying and selling prices of underlying investments in the portfolio. Unlike shares whereby broker commissions and stamp duty are paid by a fund on each transaction, other types of investments (such as bonds, money instruments, derivatives, collective investment schemes) do not have separately identifiable transaction costs; these costs form part of the dealing spread. Dealing spreads vary considerably depending on the transaction value and money market sentiment.

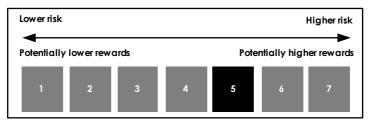
