Manager's Investment Report

Investment Objective and Policy

The investment objective of the Trust is to maintain capital and to provide a return in line with money market rates, before charges.

The Trust will invest in short term deposits, government bonds issued in Pounds Sterling and repos. The maximum maturity of these instruments is 397 days but the Trust must maintain a weighted average maturity of less than 60 days.

The bonds that the Trust invests in must be investment grade (rated as lower risk).

The Trust may also invest in other money market instruments and other money market funds. The Trust may use derivatives for efficient portfolio management purposes only. Where the Manager considers it appropriate, for example, in times of market stress, the Trust may be significantly invested in government and public securities.

During the year under review, the published price of the Trust's R-Class accumulation units increased by 4.79%.

Market/Economic Review

Sterling money market rates rose notably over the 12-month period against a backdrop of persistent inflation, UK interest rate rises, and a weak economic outlook. The Sterling Overnight Index Average reference rate, known as SONIA, rose from 3.43% to 5.19%.

Over the year under review, inflationary pressures and tighter monetary policy continued to dominate the thoughts of market participants. Fears of an economic slowdown remain at the forefront of the minds of investors but, even with inflation falling across developed markets, Bank of England (BoE) officials have indicated that it is appropriate to keep rates higher for longer and no sharp cutting of rates is anticipated imminently.

In the UK, there was positive news on the inflation front as wage growth slowed yet further in the three months to November, rising at an annual rate of 6.50%, down from 7.20% in the three months to October. Meanwhile, annualised inflation itself fell sharply to 3.90% in November, from 4.60% in October, before ticking up to 4.00% in December.

In terms of monetary policy, the BoE held firm in its monetary policy stance despite the US Federal Reserve (Fed) pivoting on their forward guidance in December. The BoE has held rates unchanged at the 15-year high of 5.25% since its August 2023 meeting, while expectations for rate cuts have been pushed into the back end of 2024 at the earliest. Elsewhere, the UK economy grew by more than expected in November, following a buoyant month for services and retail.

Benchmark developed market government bond yields painted a mixed and nuanced picture over the year. At the headline level, the yield on the 10-year US Treasury and 10-year UK Gilt were largely flat over the year, but that masks moves of more than 100 basis point higher and then lower over the course of the 12 months.

Treasury yields fell sharply (prices rose) late in the year on expectations that Fed rate hiking has finished and rate-cutting was on the agenda in 2024. The yield on the 10-year UK Gilt jumped in May, June, and July to match the heady highs it reached during the brief tenure of the Liz Truss-led conservative government during September and October of 2022, before moving lower on better-than-expected inflation data in the second half of the year.

In the US, Fed Chair Jay Powell poured cold water on the prospects of an interest rate cut in March, despite inflation continuing to fall. The US central bank chief explained that the Fed needs to have confidence that inflation is 'sustainably' lower. US interest rates remains at a 23-year high of between 5.25% and 5.50%, while the Fed's so-called 'dot-plot' is predicting rates at between 4.50% and 4.75% by the end of the year. Meanwhile, the US economy grew at a faster-than-expected rate in the fourth quarter of 2023, growing at an annualised rate of 3.30% (versus forecasts of 2.00%).

The European Central Bank (ECB) kept its headline deposit facility rate at an all-time high of 4.00% in January, with President Christine Lagarde reiterating that it is premature to be discussing interest rate cuts. Calls for a loosening of monetary policy were supported by falling inflation in Germany and France, with German consumer prices rising at an annualised rate of 3.10% in December, while French inflation fell to a two-year low of 2.40% in the 12 months to January. Meanwhile, there was bad news for Germany as the region's largest economy won the undesired title of 'worst performing major economy in the world' in 2023, as it contracted by 0.30%.

Trust Review

The Trust remains invested in a diverse range of high-quality and liquid issues. Its aim is to provide capital stability and a return in line with money market rates whilst providing daily access to liquidity and providing an income. It is actively managed, and invests in short-term, Sterling-based assets which are issued by governments, high-quality banks, and companies.

The overall portfolio shape remains unchanged, and we continued to maintain a highly liquid, diversified portfolio, with a focus on very high quality names.

Outlook

Looking ahead, our view is that US recession risk is under appreciated, but the chances of a soft landing have improved in recent months due to a loosening of financial conditions following the fall in Treasury yields, signaling a dovish pivot from the Fed. However, macroeconomic cycles generally take longer than anticipated to manifest and as we move further into the year, we will see if the resilience of the US economy continues.

2024 is a year when almost half of the world's population heads to the polls which brings geopolitical uncertainty, but also the prospect of fiscal stimulus in the form of pre-election give-aways. The market consensus is for a soft landing. However, if 2023 taught anything, is that forecasts can be impacted by a myriad of factors.

Independent auditor's report to the Unitholders of Legal & General Cash Trust ('the Trust')

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of the Trust for the year ended 5 February 2024 which comprise the Statement of Total Return, the Statement of Change in Net Assets Attributable to Unitholders, the Balance Sheet, the Related Notes and Distribution Tables for the Trust and the accounting policies set out on pages 18 to 19.

In our opinion, the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view, in accordance with UK accounting standards, including
 FRS 102 The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of
 Ireland, of the financial position of the Trust as at 5 February 2024 and of the net
 revenue and the net capital gains on the property of the Trust for the year then
 ended; and
- have been properly prepared in accordance with the Trust Deed, the Statement of Recommended Practice relating to UK Authorised Funds, and the COLL Rules.

Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK) ("ISAs (UK)") and applicable law. Our responsibilities are described below. We have fulfilled our ethical responsibilities under, and are independent of the Trust in accordance with, UK ethical requirements including the FRC Ethical Standard.

We have received all the information and explanations which we consider necessary for the purposes of our audit and we believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is a sufficient and appropriate basis for our opinion.

Going concern

The Manager has prepared the financial statements on the going concern basis as they do not intend to liquidate the Trust or to cease their operations, and as they have concluded that the Trust's financial position means that this is realistic. They have also concluded that there are no material uncertainties that could have cast significant doubt over their ability to continue as a going concern for at least a year from the date of approval of the financial statements ("the going concern period").

In our evaluation of the Manager's conclusions, we considered the inherent risks to the Trust's business model and analysed how those risks might affect the Trust's financial resources or ability to continue operations over the going concern period.

Our conclusions based on this work:

- we consider that the Manager's use of the going concern basis of accounting in the preparation of the financial statements is appropriate;
- we have not identified, and concur with the Manager's assessment that there is not, a material uncertainty related to events or conditions that, individually or collectively, may cast significant doubt on the Trust's ability to continue as a going concern for the going concern period.

However, as we cannot predict all future events or conditions and as subsequent events may result in outcomes that are inconsistent with judgements that were reasonable at the time they were made, the above conclusions are not a guarantee that the Trust will continue in operation.

Fraud and breaches of laws and regulations - ability to detect

Identifying and responding to risks of material misstatement due to fraud

To identify risks of material misstatement due to fraud ("fraud risks") we assessed events or conditions that could indicate an incentive or pressure to commit fraud or provide an opportunity to commit fraud. Our risk assessment procedures included:

- Enquiring of directors as to the Trust's high-level policies and procedures to prevent and detect fraud, as well as whether they have knowledge of any actual, suspected or alleged fraud;
- Assessing the segregation of duties in place between the Manager, the Trustee, the Administrator and the Investment Adviser;
- Reading board minutes.

As required by auditing standards, we perform procedures to address the risk of management override of controls, in particular the risk that management may be in a position to make inappropriate accounting entries. On this audit we do not believe there is a fraud risk related to revenue recognition because the revenue is principally nonjudgemental and based on publicly available information, with limited opportunity for manipulation. We did not identify any additional fraud risks.

We evaluated the design and implementation of the controls over journal entries and other adjustments and made inquiries of the Administrator about inappropriate or unusual activity relating to the processing of journal entries and other adjustments. We identified and selected a sample of journal entries made at the end of the reporting period and tested those substantively including all material post-closing entries. Based on the results of our risk assessment procedures and understanding of the process, including the segregation of duties between the Directors and the Administrator, no further high-risk journal entries or other adjustments were identified.

Identifying and responding to risks of material misstatement due to non-compliance with laws and regulations

We identified areas of laws and regulations that could reasonably be expected to have a material effect on the financial statements from our general commercial and sector experience and through discussion with the Manager and the Administrator (as required by auditing standards) and discussed with the Directors the policies and procedures regarding compliance with laws and regulations.

The potential effect of these laws and regulations on the financial statements varies considerably.

Firstly, the Trust is subject to laws and regulations that directly affect the financial statements including financial reporting legislation (including related authorised fund legislation maintained by the Financial Conduct Authority) and taxation legislation and we assessed the extent of compliance with these laws and regulations as part of our procedures on the related financial statement items.

Independent Auditor's Report continued

Secondly, the Trust is subject to many other laws and regulations where the consequences of non-compliance could have a material effect on amounts or disclosures in the financial statements, for instance through the imposition of fines or litigation. We identified the following areas as those most likely to have such an effect: money laundering, data protection and bribery and corruption legislation recognising the Trust's activities. Auditing standards limit the required audit procedures to identify non-compliance with these laws and regulations to enquiry of the Directors and the Administrator and inspection of regulatory and legal correspondence, if any. Therefore if a breach of operational regulations is not disclosed to us or evident from relevant correspondence, an audit will not detect that breach.

Context of the ability of the audit to detect fraud or breaches of law or regulation

Owing to the inherent limitations of an audit, there is an unavoidable risk that we may not have detected some material misstatements in the financial statements, even though we have properly planned and performed our audit in accordance with auditing standards. For example, the further removed non-compliance with laws and regulations is from the events and transactions reflected in the financial statements, the less likely the inherently limited procedures required by auditing standards would identify it.

In addition, as with any audit, there remained a higher risk of non-detection of fraud, as these may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal controls. Our audit procedures are designed to detect material misstatement. We are not responsible for preventing non-compliance or fraud and cannot be expected to detect non-compliance with all laws and regulations.

Other information

The Manager (Legal & General (Unit Trust Managers) Limited) is responsible for the other information presented in the Annual Manager's Report together with the financial statements. Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and, accordingly, we do not express an audit opinion or, except as explicitly stated below, any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

Our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether, based on our financial statements audit work, the information therein is materially misstated or inconsistent with the financial statements or our audit knowledge. Based solely on that work:

- we have not identified material misstatements in the other information; and
- in our opinion the information given in Manager's Report for the financial year is consistent with the financial statements.

Matters on which we are required to report by exception

We have nothing to report in respect of the following matters where under the COLL Rules we are required to report to you if, in our opinion:

- · proper accounting records for the Trust have not been kept; or
- the financial statements are not in agreement with the accounting records.

Notes to the Financial Statements

1. Statement of Compliance

The Financial Statements have been prepared in compliance with UK Financial Reporting Standard 102 (FRS 102) and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice for UK Authorised Funds issued by the Investment Association in May 2014 (2014 SORP) and amended in June 2017.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Basis of Preparation

The Financial Statements have been prepared on a going concern basis, under the historical cost convention as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities measured at fair value through profit or loss. In making this assessment, the Manager has considered, amongst other things, factors such as Trust size, cash flows through the Trust and Trust liquidity in its assessment of the Trust's ability to meet its liabilities as they fall due at least the twelve month period from the date the financial statements are signed. Based on this assessment, the Manager deems the basis of preparation appropriate.

The principal accounting policies which have been applied consistently are set out below.

(b) Functional and Presentation Currency

The functional and presentation currency of the Trust is Sterling.

(c) Recognition of Revenue

Interest and revenue from short term deposits is recognised on an accruals basis.

All other revenue is recognised on an accruals basis.

(d) Treatment of Expenses

All expenses (other than those relating to the purchase and sale of investments) are charged against revenue on an accruals basis.

(e) Distribution Policy

The policy is to distribute all available revenue, after deduction of those expenses which are chargeable in calculating the distribution. In order to conduct a controlled dividend flow, interim distributions will be at the Manager's discretion, up to a maximum of the distributable revenue for the period. All remaining revenue is distributed in accordance with the COLL.

Fund Management Fees are deducted from revenue for the purpose of calculating the distribution.

Distributions which have remained unclaimed by Unitholders for over six years are credited to the capital property of the Trust.

(f) Basis of Valuation of Investments

All investments are valued at their fair value as at 12 noon on 5 February 2024, being the last business day of the accounting year. The fair value for non-derivative securities is bid market price, excluding any accrued interest.

Where values cannot be readily determined, the securities are valued at the Manager's best assessment of their fair and reasonable value.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies continued

(g) Taxation

Provision is made for taxation at current rates on the excess of investment revenue over expenses.

Deferred tax is provided for on all timing differences that have originated but not reversed by the balance sheet date, other than those differences that are regarded as permanent. Any liability to deferred tax is provided for at the average rate of tax expected to apply.

12. Financial Instruments and Associated Risks

The investments of a Trust in financial securities and derivatives are subject to normal market fluctuations and other risks inherent in investing in such instruments. Legal & General (Unit Trust Managers) Limited (UTM) is the Authorised Fund Manager and has responsibility for ensuring appropriate risk management processes are implemented for each Unit Trust.

The UTM Board has delegated the risk oversight function to the Fund Manager Oversight Committee (FMOC), a committee of the Legal & General Investment Management (Holdings) Limited (LGIMH) Board that meets monthly. The primary objective of the FMOC is to ensure proper oversight of the investment management activities and associated services performed by LGIM, its delegates and other Fund Managers, under the Investment Management Agreement (IMA), on behalf of UTM in its capacity as Authorised Fund Manager. The committee consists of senior members of LGIMH and members of the UTM Board. Other senior staff members are also in attendance, as required by the agenda.

Each Trust has Investment Guidelines, an Investment Objective and Investment Restrictions, against which the fund manager will operate. These are set out in Schedule 1 of the IMA between LGIM and UTM. The Schedule is maintained by each fund manager, reviewed by the LGIM Operational Risk and Compliance Teams and approved senior members of LGIMH on behalf of the UTM board. The Schedule provides the detail needed to determine the risk profile for each fund. Fund managers are not permitted to invest into any new instruments without first gaining approval from UTM.

The Investment Objective and Policy of this Trust is detailed on page 2.

(a) Market Risk arising from other price risk

Market Risk arises mainly from uncertainty about future prices. It represents the potential loss the Trust may suffer through holding market positions in the face of market movements.

Other price risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices (other than those arising from interest rate risk or currency risk), whether those changes are caused by factors specific to the individual financial instrument or its issuer, or factors affecting similar instruments traded in the market.

The assets held by the Trust can be seen in the Portfolio Statement starting on page 9. Movements in the prices of these investments result in movements in the performance of the Trust. The Manager adheres to the investment guidelines established in the Trust Deed, the Prospectus, the COLL and the Trust's IOG, and in this way, monitors and controls the exposure to risk from any type of security, sector or issuer.

As at the balance sheet date, the Trust had no significant exposure to market price risk (5 February 2023: same).

12. Financial Instruments and Associated Risks continued

(b) Interest Rate Risk

Interest Rate Risk is the risk of movements in the value of financial instruments as a result of fluctuations in interest rates.

The Trust is exposed to interest rate risk through its holdings in debt securities. The market value of debt securities and any floating rate payments from debt securities held (and interest rate swaps) may fluctuate as a result of changes in interest rates. This risk is managed by the active monitoring and adjustment of the investments held by the Trust, in line with the stated investment objective and policy of the Trust.

As at the balance sheet date, if interest rates on the Trust increased or decreased by 1 basis point, with all other variables remaining constant, then the net assets attributable to unitholders would increase or decrease by approximately £35,959 (5 February 2023: £29,254). This represents the Manager's best estimate of a reasonable possible shift in interest rates, having regard to historical volatility of those rates.

(d) Credit Risk

Credit Risk is the risk of suffering financial loss as a result of a counterparty to a financial transaction being unable to fulfil their financial obligations as they fall due.

(e) Liquidity Risk

Liquidity Risk relates to the capacity to meet liabilities as they fall due. The primary source of this risk to the Trust is the liability to Unitholders for any cancellation of units.

This risk is minimised by holding a large proportion of readily realisable assets, cash balances and via access to overdraft facilities.

(f) Fair Value

The fair value of a financial instrument is the amount for which it could be exchanged between knowledgeable, willing parties in an arm's length transaction. There is no material difference between the value of the financial assets and liabilities, as shown in the financial statements, and their fair value.

15. Ultimate controlling party and related party transactions

Legal & General (Unit Trust Managers) Limited acts as the principal on all the transactions of the units in the Trust. The aggregated monies received through creations or paid on cancellations are disclosed in the statement of change in net assets attributable to unitholders.

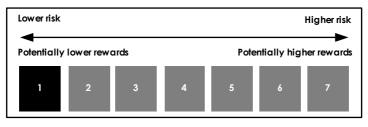
