The market is relatively illiquid, however, and the costs of dealing are likely to be high. Venture Capital Trust shares commonly trade at a discount to the value of their underlying assets. A sale in the secondary market is unlikely to realise the full value of your investment. The company arranged a tender offer to buy back up to 10% of its issued shares at a 5% discount to NAV in 2017. It intends to make further buy back offers "from time to time"
